2022 has been about resilience. We returned to school mourning the loss of one of our students over the holiday break, while those young people most directly affected by this had to remain at home due to the COVID-affected staggered start. A teacher shortage combined with the COVID-19 pandemic made putting teachers in front of classes very difficult, particularly in Semester 1, and in addition to that, we are completely at capacity, so finding enough classrooms has also been a challenge - we have had some lessons in very odd spots. Year 7s entering secondary school while undergoing that staggered start was, likewise, challenging and, to be honest, the demeanour and language of some of our new students was not at all what we are used to and took us somewhat by surprise.

However, in true Grant High School fashion, we have persevered and everything was a lot better in Semester 2, although student behavior-wise we are probably still not where we finished last year. As a result, next year will see us working with our school community to develop a school-wide positive behavior approach to building conditions for learning. We are proud of our ability to see a problem and work towards a solution with optimism and commitment. On that note, as we have reached the end of a third COVID-affected year, we acknowledge everyone is sad about those things we have been unable to do over the last few years, and Grant High School staff are no different. We are happy to receive feedback but please continue to be kind in the way you write to and about us in emails and on social media.

We have seen significant progress in the implementation of our Site Improvement Plan with Caroline Wakefield leading this process with forensic planning and detail. It has been a joy to observe our educators developing their skills in teaching reading and comprehension during some of our Student Free Days, while others have been devoted to work on lesson structure and pedagogy.

On the sporting field we have seen success football particular in and basketball this year winning state titles in Division Two and Division Three of these competitions respectively; unfortunately, the continued lack of temporary relief teachers will mean that we must confine ourselves to local knock-out competitions next year, with the exception of Adelaide Athletics. We thank the school community their understanding for of these constraints, acknowledging that other schools will also be facing the same problem and possibly reaching a similar decision. P.T.O

STUDENT FORUM

In week 6 three students from our school joined many other public-school students at the Department for Education Public Schools Student Forum. Max Hooper, Shayla Cole, and Kodi Burfitt represented our school proudly, and sat down and chatted with Chief Executive, Professor Martin Westwell about what it means to be a public-school student. The day saw students from all over our region discuss the needs and successes of South Australia students. They interpreted data (ranging from NAPLAN scores to 2022s wellbeing survey) and explored patterns, celebrated success, and helped identify the next steps for our education system. Max, Shayla, and Kodi were tasked with looking into South Australian students' perseverance and academic self-concept, and found a correlation between students' level of self-belief and willingness to try. They came up with suggestions for how we as teachers, staff, and as a department as a whole can help improve this. Our last session of the day saw our Grant High School students working with other schools to look into research from around the world, and discuss how what they have found could benefit South Australian students


