



In 2023, we experienced changes, challenges, and successes. I assumed the role of Principal in a new leadership team. Three staff members became Community Leaders, and five teachers took on Coordinator roles. This shift brought enthusiasm and innovative initiatives. Despite teacher shortages posing difficulties, our team persevered, creating excellent programs for positive student outcomes.

Thanks to our outstanding staff for their efforts; we have a great team.

This year, a significant change was the inclusion of approximately 16 parent volunteers for Knockout Sports. They completed volunteer training at the beginning of the year, supporting students in winning local rounds and competing in the State Finals in Adelaide. Four successful trips to Adelaide were made possible by our dedicated volunteers. I extend my public acknowledgment and thanks to those who supported our students and school community. This initiative will continue in 2024, and I encourage interested families to get in touch for volunteering opportunities.

The introduction of the Government's mobile phone policy at Grant High School faced challenges during Semester 2. A state-wide ban on mobile phones led to the implementation of Yondr pouches.

Although there were minor issues initially, all students received pouches. However, only a small percentage are using them correctly. Despite this, mobile phone use has decreased. In 2024, there will be a renewed emphasis on using Yondr pouches, with different incentives explored for positive use.

This year we also experienced several successes. In Knockout Sport, we made the State Finals in 6 different sports, with great results in Basketball and Netball, in which we were the State Champions and State Runner Up Champions, respectively. We also achieved outstanding results in the STEM Challenge, finishing top in the State competition and second overall in the National titles. Fantastic achievements for all involved. Our Agriculture program has continued to blossom, with students achieving excellent results in the various competitions they participated in this year, again a credit to all involved.

2023 also saw the beginning of our restorative practices journey, in which staff completed training on Trauma Informed Practice and using a Restorative approach when supporting students. With this come the implementation of the Reset and Return Space, a room staffed by some of our amazing SSO's, that provides students with a space and supports to help


Railway Walk
